- KIWIN'S began when Sid Smith (past CNH Kiwanis District Governor) wanted his daughters to join a service organization in 1973-1974
- Key Club was the only organization, but it was an **All-Male** club
- Smith created a club called Keyettes (service club for girls)



Key Club vs KIWIN'S

- Key Club began as a junior service branch of the already established Kiwanis Club
- It was established to be a wholesome alternative to high school fraternities
- CNH Key Club is much larger than CNH KIWIN'S
- KIWIN'S was established in the 70's as an all girls club
- KIWIN'S is more tight knit as it is a smaller district of Key Club

Introduction

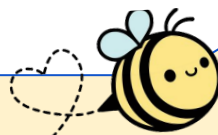

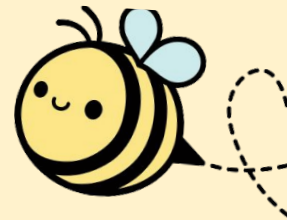

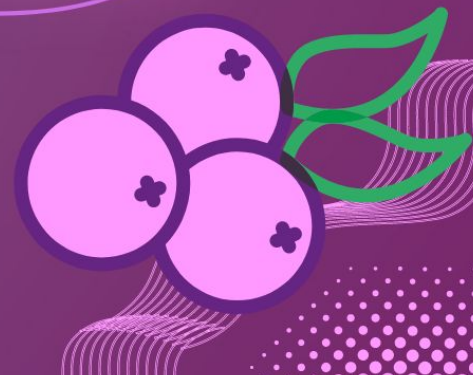

standard form of **CLUB BYLAWS**

Club Bylaws are a set of rules that guide the processes of a club & are created by the club's elected officers (Board of Directors). They can include anything from officer tasks to the set of graduation requirements!

Club Bylaws provide structure by providing guidelines to how the club should run & supporting officers when in need of assistance!

revision process

The Board of Directors can **change bylaws** to fit the **needs of the club**, as long as they follow the International & District Bylaws. (Found on KCI website & CNH Cyberkey)

Clubs should use the official standard club bylaws template provided by KCI & create necessary revisions

Proposed amendments should be read at a **general membership meeting** OR sent to **each member** in writing. After at least one week from the initial proposal, there must be a **TWO-THIRDS vote of dues-paid members** present at a general membership meeting to allow the amendments to be adopted!

YOUTH OPPORTUNITY FUND (YOF)

Funded by the Kiwanis Children's Fund, the **Youth Opportunities Fund (YOF)** is a grant provided by KCI that is available to all Key Clubs in good standing, meaning the club has on-time paid dues, to support a service project!

How do I submit?

1. Clubs must plan the service project & create a balanced budget. (Funds are typically granted to clubs that also work with **other organizations** to fund & complete the project!)
2. Clubs must then complete a **community-needs assessment** to evaluate the strengths & weaknesses of the service project
3. Submit an online application through the *Foundant* website **BEFORE** the specified deadlines.
→ There are **TWO** funding cycles for YOF grants per year: **October 15th** & **March 1st**
4. Applications are reviewed by the KCI Board & decisions are made for all grant applicants **one month later**. If a club receives a grant, they must submit a report **one year later** to qualify for future funding!

Clubs receive anywhere from **\$250 to \$2,000** to go towards a unique service project that

addresses a need within the community,

offers a creative & defensible solution,

was thoughtfully prepared,

has a reasonable financial plan, & supports at least one **Kiwanis Children's Fund cause area**.

(Health, Education or Youth Leadership Development)

Funds granted must be spent within 12 months of when it is awarded!

july 2022 recognition - bee clean

We had a meeting with our local Kiwanis a week prior to event and talked about how our club was planning on creating a project regarding children's education and gave them a few ideas of what we were planning (book buddies, book giveaways, etc.). They offered to collaborate with us since they have a stash of books that were donated to them and told us that every year, the Jr. Giants (a softball team in our community) does a gear and book giveaway for the members and so we attended the event, helped out at the booth with the books, and helped each child find a book they might be interested in since we had a large selection. This project helped our club not only bond with our local Kiwanis but also some of the young folk in our community.
