Please ensure that you understand the dues payment process and emphasize the importance of dues payment to the members that you serve. You are allowed to collect a minimum donation of \$11.50 to a maximum donation of \$23.00. I highly encourage that you work towards the early bird deadline of November 1st although the on time deadline is December 1st. Please keep in mind that these deadlines are received by therefore, you may need to plan head. Remember that dues can be submitted multiple times so I encourage you to submit dues as soon as members turn them in. I hope to see your clubs received payment on the dues report! In addition, Fall Rally is just around the corner. Keep up the awesome fundraisers for our

What are they?

- Grants to assist Kiwanis clubs and divisions and Service Leadership Programs (SLP) clubs in financing new service projects which address pediatric trauma program and injury prevention.

Application and Requirements

1. A completed PTP Grant Application.
2. A project budget shall include all sources of funding, including funds committed by the club, "in-kind" donations and any other sources of outside funding.
3. A copy of the club's current year Community Service Budget.


Examples of Workshops

Locations

Locations and dates vary, so **connect** with your **local Circle K Clubs** to see if they're putting a Key to College together! Generally, Key to Colleges have been in the **Summer, Fall, and Winter**, but you can always **request your local Circle K Clubs to put one together** as well!



FAFSA

The **Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)** is a form completed by current and prospective college students to determine their eligibility for **student financial aid**.

Who qualifies

Most students are eligible to receive financial aid. Your age, race, or field of study won't affect your eligibility. While your income is taken into consideration, it does not prevent you from getting federal student aid.

- ❖ Don't leave blank fields
- ❖ Triple check your data inputted

Types of Financial Aid

There are **four main types** of financial aid for college students including **grants, scholarships, loans, and work-study funds**. Make sure you understand the differences between each one before applying!!



Deadline

Because of the variation in state and college deadlines, it is highly recommended that you fill out the FAFSA **as soon as you can after October 1** to ensure that you do not miss out on available aid.

The **Patient Service** story that is featured on the Kiwanis International website by Julie Saetre posted on August 2nd, 2019 highlights the works of **two Kiwanis Clubs' in France!** The clubs goals were to create a distraction for the youth that visit the hospitals. In order to complete this goal, the Kiwanis Club of Moulins partnered with Maxi Toys and the Leclerc superstore, providing two electric cars for the youth to be accompanied in on their way to the operation room. The partners also donated games to the pediatrics ward that kids could use, while the Kiwanis Club donated funds to the hospital to create a children's corner.



The Kiwanis Club of Moulins Femme en Bourbonnais reaches out to the children and adolescent patients of the Moulins-Yzeure psychiatry unit. The members of the kiwanis club support the unit by providing them with funds for both a "Clown Workshop" for children, helping to develop relationship skills, and a program for helping teenage patients become more independent through a process of enhancing common daily social skills. The club also supported the creation of a family room where patients can relax and develop their social skills more.

ATTN: Trick-or-Treat

Clubs that raise and submit more than US \$250 by December 31 will receive a special banner patch.

Be sure to include "Trick-or-Treat" and your club number on the check's memo line.

If your club uses a coin counting kiosk such as Coinstar to submit the money directly to UNICEF USA, along with your receipts to the Children's Fund immediately. We will notify UNICEF USA and ensure the gift is credited to your club and The Eliminate Project. Coinstar machine does keep 8% of the total as the fee.

The Youth Opportunities Fund (YOF) is a fund for Key Club International held within the Kiwanis International Foundation. This fund uses earned interest to support Key Clubs and Key Club members serve the world by providing grants for service. Any club or member can apply, and there is **only ONE funding cycle per year**. The fund also provides **academic scholarships** for higher education.

What is Candidate Training Conference?

Candidate Training Conference or CTC, is an educational experience where passionate Key Clubbers come together to gain insight on the Division, the job of a Lieutenant Governor, and much more on what it means to serve.

Even if you do not intend on running for Lieutenant Governor, CTC is an extremely viable option. Not only do you get to meet other dedicated members from your region, but it prepares you through group activities, educational anecdotes, and many other ways on how to deal with the stress, high workloads, and how to improve your ethic as a leader in Key Club, other organizations, and daily life. Also, CTC is considered a Training Conference which will help fulfill the two Training Conference requirement for Bronze-Level membership.


Ultimately, CTC was an amazingly helpful and meaningful experience for me, and I encourage EVERYONE to attend!”



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
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
