

- how much members receive for scholarships



- Take many photos/screenshots and be ready to provide extensive documentation regarding the planning and execution of your project





#### Slice of PIE: SafeKey for the School Year

#### What is SafeKey?

SafeKey - a CNH term for maintaining professional and appropriate behaviour at Key Club functions, social media, and beyond. SafeKey applies to your language and actions, both online and offline. SafeKey means that we do not act in a discourteous manner to those around us.

# BEE CLEAN, CNH!

## recycling drive Woodcreek | R16 | D44W

"The Recycling drive event was an interclub between D44W's Roseville and Woodcreek Key Club. It was in coordination with the July Spotlight on Service focus-Bee Clean, CNH. We worked with Roseville key club in discussing items related to potential locations, dates, times and other details. The event itself was split up into 2 sections- sign making and sign-waving. Members were able to sign up to volunteer at both the poster making and sign-waving events through a google form. Firstly, the sign-making took place on July 26th at Royer Park from 10-1 PM. At this time members created posters/signs that were used to advertise the drive. Next on July 28th, 29th, and 30th we had shifts of 10-12 pm, 12-2 pm, and 2-3 pm on all 3 days where members were able to sign-wave to help gain publicity for the event, while other volunteers assisted at the drop-off/collection table. The sign-waving and the recyclable drop took place at Woodcreek High School. At the drop off we accepted: CRV beverage containers, clean aluminum cans, plastic bottles, and clear + colored plastic containers. We brought trash bags, gloves and boxes to sort through and organize recyclables. We then dropped off recyclables at Nortech Waste Recycling Center (3033 Fiddyment Road, Roseville, CA) in exchange for funds. In total we fundraised about \$201.66 and all money collected from recyclables were donated to PTP."





#### albany bulb park cleanup

For this month, Albany Key Club focused more on keeping the local parks clean. We originally planned three park clean ups but due to the sudden change in location, we had to cancel the first one. However for our second park clean up, we cleaned around a local beach area. The Albany Bulb clean up was an interclub event with El Cerrito. The event had two portions; clean up and pizza fundraiser. It was quite a big event so we started planning at the end of June. On the day of the event, the clean up portion started at 4 pm and we picked up trash along the bulb for an hour and thirty minutes. We provided trash bags. Safety and COVID-19 guidelines were followed at all times and of course, a COVID-19 liability form was required. The last clean up of the month was at our Kiwanis Little Park in El Cerrito. Our Kiwanis wanted to join the event and so we made the location and time of the event the same as our Kiwanis planned. Our Kiwanis provided trash bags and tools such as rakes. The event happened for an hour. This project was successful. We had so much fun cleaning up parks and it made us feel really happy when random people appreciate us for doing that. With this event, members were happy to spend their weekend out and it was a great chance to get fresh air while doing service. Members did a really good job picking up trash and everyone worked hard.

The Pediatric Trauma Program works to prevent pediatric trauma by providing educational materials, safety equipment, and training for doctors, nurses, and first responders.



Besides preparing what to say, you should also prepare what to bring, from posters to spirit sticks, to even candy, bring whatever you think will help your booth stand out to observing students.




#### ORIGAMI BOOKMARK MAKING

and videos of our members creating these bookmarks. I believe it is fair to say


