



Embrace the beautiful differences you share with your peers and welcome people of all backgrounds and ethnicities to join in serving your home, school, and community. In Key Club, we can spread this passion of service together as one.

HOW CAN YOU BE INCLUSIVE?

1. LEAVE YOUR ASSUMPTIONS AT THE DOOR.

It's easy to make assumptions about others, but these often lead to misunderstandings and biases. The next time oyu find yourself cfeating assumptions in your head like "they're too popular to talk to me" or "they're too busy," stop yourself! Approach the person and talk to them! A little confidence and a positive is all you need!

3. ASK THE RIGHT QUESTIONS!

Evaluate what situation or setting you're in and use that to spark a conversation! If you are at a DCM, you could ask "Do you usually attend DCM's?" or "What school are you from?" If you're at a service event, you could ask "What time did you wake up to be here?" Don't think that it's weird to ask these questions. Put yourself in their shoes — would you think it;s weird or think it's a mature move to apprach a person

2. TALKING TO THOSE WHO ARE ALONE.

See that person sitting alone on their phone?

Go talk to them! It starts with a simple greeting and you can make a new friend along the way. Ask them about their interests and hobbies and chances are that you'll have something in common. If someone joins your group and talks to you, include them in your conversation! It may be a little awkward at first, but it's definitely worth it

4. ASK EVERYONE FOR THEIR INPUT!

Let's be honest, meetings can get boring with the same people talking and others remaining silent the whole time. Ask the people who's not talking for their input and ideas. They could potentially bring a refreshing idea that no one thought of yet. You could also rotate who runs the meetings. Give other officers the chance to express their creativity and enhance their leadership skills in a productive setting!

INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION ELECTIONS

International elections will take place at the Key Club International Convention location of that year. You must be endorsed by your District or you may choose to run during general session at International Convention. You must be in attendance at International Convention to run for your position. If chosen for International Endorsement, you must fill out all election forms and have them submitted by the date indicated on the forms.

All members arrive at International Convention. To be a delegate, you must be in attendance at International Convention. Delegates have a separate form that must be filled out turned in at registration.

After all candidates have presented, all members will vote for their top seven to eleven candidates to move onto the next round. Any ballot that does not have at least seven chosen candidates will be disregarded. After District Caucus is the Nominating Conference. Everyone will gather into the selected meeting place. The current International President will announce the results.

During the District
Caucus, sister districts will
evaluate the
qualifications of each
candidate. All candidate'
votes post-caucus
narrow down the amount
that move on to
Nominating Conference.
All members are required
to attend. You must sit
with your respective
districts.

President and Vice
President will have been narrowed down to the top two people each and International Trustees will be narrowed down to the top thirteen. Meet the Candidates will occur next. This is in a general session setting where the President/Vice Presidents and trustees answer questions from the "fish bowl" of questions.

The moderator will call in the candidate to the room. They will have a set time limit to read both their speeches and answer any questions asked. Candidates must not be touched and asked to do anything deemed inappropriate. There will only be one candidate in each room at a time.

Final voting takes place at House of Delegates. All delegates will hear the final speeches of every candidate and vote for each respective position via electronics. The winners of International Trustee will be announced by the International President at the Closing Session.


