## YOUTH OPPORTUNITIES FUND

# what is it?

The Youth Opportunities Fund (YOF) is a fund for Key Club International held within the Kiwanis International Foundation. This fund uses earned interest to support Key Clubs and Key Club members serve the world by providing grants for service. Any club or member can apply, and there is only ONE funding cycle per year. The fund also provides academic scholarships for higher education.

# how to apply

To access the application, look on the CNH Cyberkey under Projects > Youth Opportunities Fund. When completing the application ensure that all signatures are collected.

The YOF grant is due on **October 15** of each year at 11:59PM EST, be sure to submit the application through the online application system on the Key Club International website.

- Resolution size: 300 pixels

- Artwork must NOT be flattened
- Artwork must be layered
  - Preferably by Illustrator or Photoshop, or other vectored software that supports layering
- Artwork MUST be submitted as two raw attachment
  - Original format as specified above with the layers
  - Portable Network Graphic (or .png)
    - Submit as a transparent file

# What is it?



# CNH FOUNDATION

Cali-Nev-Ha Children's Fund

The CNH foundation has three primary goals: combatting pediatric trauma through the **Pediatric Trauma Program**, developing the future of children via **grantmaking**, and offering **scholarships and**leadership training.

By being in **Key Club**, you are now a part of **CNH's service leadership program!** Although **PTP** is *not* one of our preferred charities, it is one of our **major emphasis charities**. Within the **Kiwanis family**, we **raise funds and awareness** for PTP and the CNH foundation

Some of the other opportunities and programs offered by the CNH foundation are the YES initiative, Founder's Day, Hope of America, Rose Float Fellowship, and the William A Dunlap Fellowship amongst other things.





The Children's Miracle Network(CMN) is a non-profit organization that works to increase funds and awareness for over 170 children's hospitals. The Kiwanis family contributes to CMN by sponsoring fundraisers and service projects. All CMN contributions directly benefit hospitals, helping to purchase up-to-date equipment, train staff, conduct life-saving research, implement outreach programs, and provide healthcare for children whose parents can't afford to pay.

March of Dimes mainly focuses on raising awareness for prematurity and reducing the rate of premature deaths. Since 1960, Key Clubbers from all over have helped raised funds in hopes of eliminating birth defects. Every Spring, there is a March for Babies which is the largest event for March of Dimes!





The United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund(UNICEF)

works to provide for children's needs in primary health care, basic education, and safe water & sanitation. They focus on helping children survive from early childhood through adolescence. The Kiwanis Family donates through Trick-Or-Treat for Unicef and the ELIMINATE project.

The Kiwanis family previously partnered with UNICEF to combat maternal and neonatal tetanus through the Eliminate Project. By spreading awareness and raising funds, key clubbers protect the lives of mothers and babies all over the globe. While the Eliminate Project is no longer a preferred charity, we still encourage members to raise awareness.




# re Our Charities?

The Pediatric Trauma Program(PTP) is NOT a preferred charity however it is a MAJOR EMPHASIS charity. The CNH Foundation established PTP in 1994 to reduce injuries caused by trauma and provide educational resources to local communities. The CNH Kiwanis family works to raise funds for PTP ensures that children live happy and safe lives.

Erika's Lighthouse is dedicated to educating and raising awareness about adolescent depression, encouraging good mental health and breaking down the stigma around mental health. They educate children, educators, and adults to ensure that no child feels alone in their depression. Starting the next term, Erika's Lighthouse will officially be a preferred charity!


### care package making

### Officers



No matter what your position is, you should always be thinking about growth. Keep in mind all of these steps require you to take the initiative, as the best officers in Key Club are those that communicate with others to then create their own initiatives to promote growth in their clubs and divisions.

### Effective Communication


Some of the many platforms that can be used for communication include Facebook Messenger, Instagram Direct Messages, Email, Google Reflector Groups, IMessage, Remind, Google Classroom, and many more. It does not necessarily matter what platforms you use but more so how you use them. Find what works best for your club/division and what works best for the intended audience of the line of communication. For example, if communicating with an individual in a club it might be best to use a more personal platform like Facebook Messenger or Message depending on preferences. A crucial part of communication is ensuring that it is interactive as opposed to passive. Communication = conversation. This means always give those you are communicating with an opportunity to respond. Whether that be requiring email responses or utilizing social media, communication is only effective when it becomes a conversation. Also ensure that you employ targeted communication if you are an officer, as you might identify clubs/individuals that require more/less or different types of communication.


