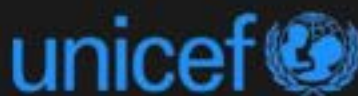

DOCUMENTS NEEDED

- FSA ID (for FAFSA filers ONLY)
- Driver's License, if you have one
- SSN Card, if you have one
- Alien Registration Card, if you have one
- ITIN, if you have one
- List of colleges you're interested in
- Most current bank statements
- Any records of untaxed income
- Prior year tax information (1040s and W2s)



FINANCIAL AID TYPES

grants

Federal or state money that is given to students and does not need to be repaid; can be merit-based or need-based.

loans

Money that students borrow to attend college; must be repaid; offered by federal government or private institutions.

work study

A program where students can earn money to help pay for school; federally funded jobs on campus or other approved locations.

scholarships

Money that does not have to be repaid; awarded by various organizations/companies based on number of factors; take time and research.

FAFSA/CA Dream app opens on October 1st and closes on March 2nd

- File for the correct financial form
 - If you are a US Citizen or eligible non-citizen
 - FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid)

 - If you are an undocumented student
 - CA Dream Act
 - <https://dream.csac.ca.gov>
- Submit a GPA verification form
- Submit any follow-up documents that your college asks for

The event serves as a way to **strengthen** the **connections** between different branches and to represent the **Kiwanis organization** as a collective unit within the **local community**.

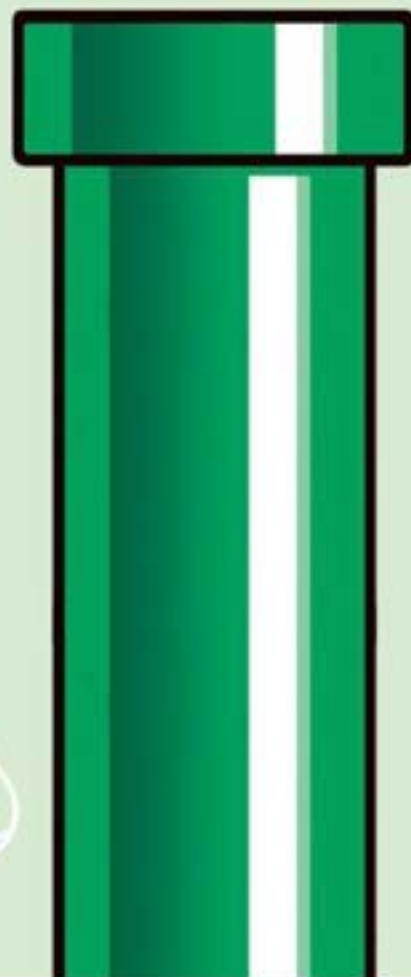

The date for K-One day changes every year, but this year, it's hosted on **October 23rd, 2021**

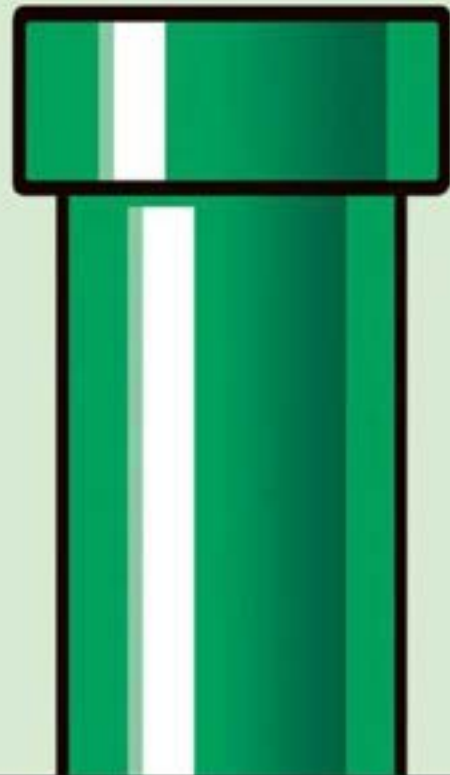
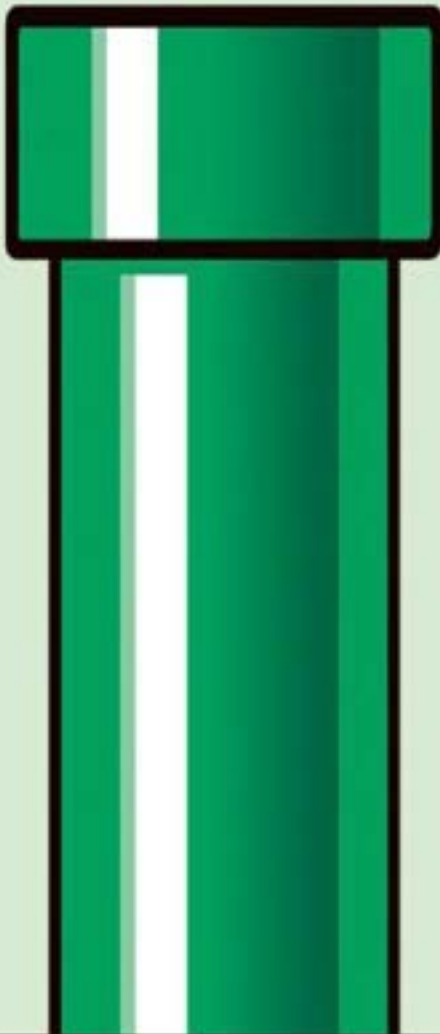


What to do on K

Youth Opportunity Fund (YOF)



What is the YOF?

The **Youth Opportunities Fund (YOF)** is a KCI fund held within the Kiwanis International Foundation. This fund aims to support **individual Key Clubs** to serve their communities by providing service grants. By working to identify needs within your community, school, or world, individual Key Clubs can receive service grants to aid them in such endeavours. We **HIGHLY** encourage you take part in this fund, as you can do so much good for your community, school, or world with such additional resources! Grant amounts between **US\$250 to US\$2,000** may be granted. Per the CNH Cyberkey, there is **ONE** funding cycle. Applications are then reviewed by a committee formed by the Key Club International Board. **The deadline to apply is on October 15th at 11:59 PM EST.** Late applications will not be accepted. **Happy applying Key Clubbers!**

Keep In Mind

- Grants are given to **CLUBS**, NOT division or region events!
- Focus on projects that let you carry out actual service and not just fundraisers alone.
- Show impactful language in your application. Make it "fluffy", allowing the committee to see your passion and vision!

Examples of YOF Grant Projects

Cloverdale Key Club of Division 32 received a YOF Grant in 2013. The members began a project known as "Doctor Dolls", bought cloth, stuffed the dolls, sewed them, and delivered them to the Oakland's Children Hospital.

2. Click "Create New Account"
3. Follow the steps from there, but remember to check if your club already has an account!

Tips for Applying

1. Look through the guidelines listed in the Key Club Guidebook under "Board Policies".
2. Make your application specific and unique to your community and passions.
3. Engage your members during the application process!



Requirements



1. Have Key Club member engagement
2. Fill a need within your community.
3. Support activities within at least one Kiwanis Children's Fund cause area: health, education or youth leadership development.
4. Spend the grant money within 12 months of when the grant is awarded.

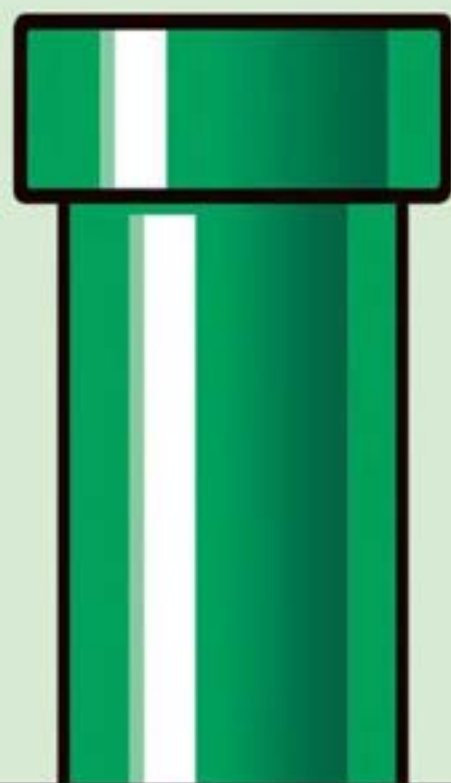

The MISSION



The mission of the Cal-Nev-Ha Children's Fund is to **build** a better future for our children by providing grant funding, scholarships & leadership training.

Club Grants

Developed in 1984 to assist clubs with seed money when the scope of a service project exceeds the club's financial resources.

Disaster Assistance Grants

Established by the Cal-Nev-Ha Children's Fund to assist Kiwanians and their clubs in providing immediate disaster relief assistance in the event of a natural disaster.

Pediatric Trauma Program Grants

Established by the Cal-Nev-Ha Children's Fund to provide grants to assist Kiwanis and Service Leadership Programs. Many times a Kiwanis club will give up on a worthwhile project because the funds required to get the project started are not available. The Cal-Nev-Ha Children's Fund makes available Pediatric Trauma Prevention grants for new projects, by providing matching start-up funds.

PTP Grants for Partner Hospitals

Makes available grants to our Partner Hospitals to assist them with their unfunded needs directly related to pediatric trauma and injury prevention.

Special Olympics/Needs Grant

The Special Olympics / Special Needs Community Grant Program was established to assist Kiwanis clubs and divisions in financing Special Olympics or Special Needs community projects that exceed their own resources.

Year-in-Review

Traditional/Digital

what is **YEAR-IN-REVIEW?**

The Year-in-Review Contest is an International Contest with **TWO different formats** - Traditional, and Digital. Clubs may enter **only one of two format types** in an entry containing pictures, souvenirs, newspaper clippings, or captions to **showcase their activities** as the term progressed. There are **six categories** which the submission must feature; Service to School, Service to Community, Fundraising Projects, Kiwanis Relations, Major Emphasis Involvement*, and Miscellaneous.

*Major Emphasis Involvement may contain service projects and fundraisers relating to the International Major Emphasis, "Children: Their Future, Our Focus."

important **INFORMATION**

- ★ The Year-in-Review contest is an **International** contest, meaning the 1st and 2nd place submissions from the CNH District will be sent to International to be judged with the winners of other Districts.
- ★ A cost sheet (available in Contest Information at cnhkeyclub.org) must be attached to **ALL** contest submissions- costs for materials **may NOT exceed \$300**.
- ★ A club may **only submit ONE submission**, traditional or digital.
- ★ Each club **MUST** be dues paid by December 1st, 2021, to be eligible for these contests.

 - Kiwanis Advisor: Kiwanis Sponsor

The Thirst Project:

The Thirst Project is a nonprofit organization that works to end the global water crisis by building freshwater wells in developing countries that need safe, clean drinking water. This organization works with youth to build a socially conscious generation by educating students. With the driving force of students, they have been able to raise over 8 million dollars, giving clean water to 13 different countries and over 280,000 people!

UNICEF:

UNICEF, also known as the United Nations Children's Fund is a United Nations agency that provides humanitarian and developmental aid to children worldwide. This agency is one of the most recognizable social welfare organizations in the world, with a presence in 192 countries and territories. UNICEF's programs emphasize developing community-level services to promote the health and well-being of children. By the end of 2020 UNICEF has reached 106 million people with water, sanitation, and hygiene supplies/services, 3 billion people with information on safety precautions, 2.5+ million health workers with personal protective equipment, and 4 million health workers with training on infection prevention and control!

Erika's Lighthouse:

Erika's Lighthouse is a non-profit organization that is dedicated to educating and raising awareness about adolescent depression, encouraging good mental health, and breaking down the stigma surrounding mental health issues. Their mission is to make sure no young person feels alone in their depression. They create upper elementary, middle school, and high school teen depression awareness programs so educators and teens can create safe spaces to learn about depression, letting students know they are never alone, and there is somewhere to turn. Thus far, their awareness programs are shown to students in 530 schools in 39 states!

As many clubs have concluded their fairs and rushes, it is time for dues season, and to start ramping up fundraising. Money can be everything from scary to confusing, and there are many incredible resources on the cyberkey to help you all out with money specifics. We want to focus on how money can enable your club to grow with proper usage.



Dues

You heard it here first folks, dues season is in full effect. It is time to start rallying the troops to pay up. However, how you go about this process can significantly impact the growth and future of your club. For starters, do not miss deadlines.
