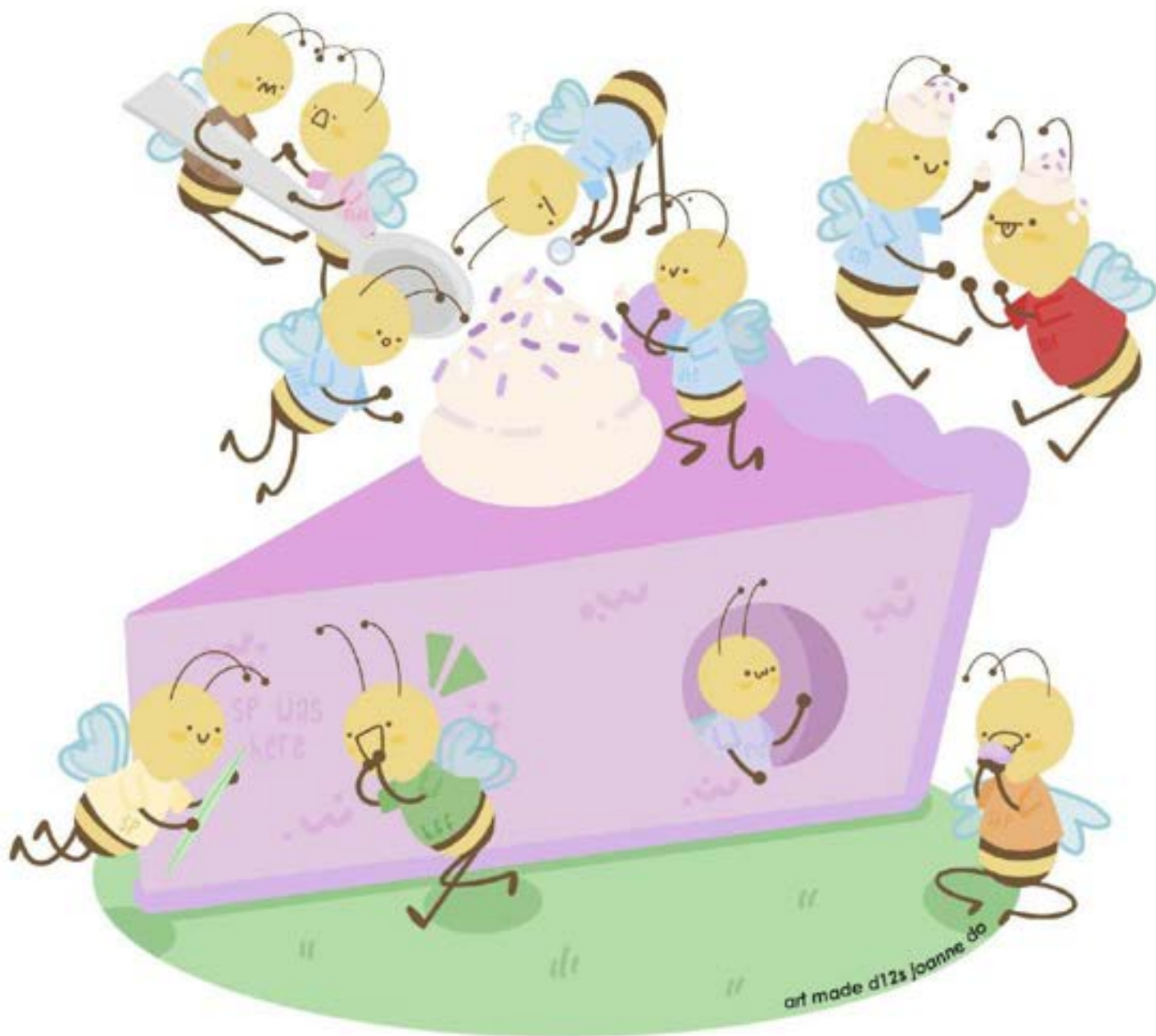

In our age of technology, everyone has instant access to social media like Instagram, where we always post about our events. Members can do things as simple as reposting and sharing instagram posts made by the division and their school club to reach a ton of people.

TEACH AT THE BEGINNING

With all of our acronyms, understanding Key Club lingo can feel impossible for new members, and we all understand that feeling. Help other members by summarizing what events are and what happens during them. There are tons of small details that club officers don't review during meetings that members need to know.



what is dcon?

District Convention (DCON) is an annual event held to **celebrate** the achievements of the term, **elect** the new District Executive Board, **attend** educational workshops, **meet** new Key Clubbers across California, Nevada, and Hawaii, and welcome the new term!

when & where is dcon?

Date: **April 1-3, 2022**

Location: **Reno Grand Sierra Resort** (2500 E 2nd St, Reno, NV 89595)

why should i attend dcon?

DCON is a weekend packed full of unforgettable experiences, including:

- Learn more about Key Club through **educational workshops** hosted by fellow members
- Recognize and **celebrate the hard work** and dedication of members, clubs, officers, and advisors
- Watch the CNH **talent show** and listen to a special **keynote speaker**
- Dance the night away at **Governor's Ball**
- Spend time with **new friends** that you make at DCON
- Experience the bittersweet ending of the term by **saying goodbye** to the 2021-2022 District Board and **welcoming** the 2022-2023 District Board
- If a delegate, **vote** for the 2022-2023 District Executive Board

FAQ

transportation & hotels

How will transportation work?

Transportation costs will vary based on the mode of transportation and your distance from Grand Sierra Resort. Examples include: **cars, trains, airplanes, and division-wide buses.**

What hotels can we stay at?

All attendees are required to stay at the **Grand Sierra Resort** (2500 E 2nd St, Reno, NV 89595).

registration

What should I complete during registration?

In addition to completing the registration for your club's attendees, you should complete SAA Registration (2 per club), Delegate Registration (2 per club), and Advisors should book hotels for themselves and their Key Club members.

What does the registration fee cover?

DCON registration will cover your Saturday breakfast, lunch, and dinner, Sunday breakfast, DCON souvenirs, and all Convention activities.

Be sure to bring extra money for Friday night's dinner, meals during traveling, and other snacks you plan to purchase during DCON 2022!

registration (cont.)

How much is on-time registration and when is it due?

On-time registration is **\$215**. It is due by **February 11, 2022**.

How much is Late Registration and when is it due?

Late Registration is **\$255**. It is due by **February 25, 2022**.

Who must pay the registration fee?

All attendees (i.e. members and chaperones) must pay the registration fee.

safety measures

What is the Code of Conduct?

The Code of Conduct:

- Can be found on the **CyberKey**
- Must be filled out by every attendee to show that they agree with all of the District's policies
- **Must be followed** by all attendees

Will chaperones require background checks?

All chaperones **MUST** complete a background check prior to DCON

GET INVOLVED

sergeant-at-arms

What is an SAA Captain?

GENERAL

- SAA stands for Sergeant-At-Arms and they are responsible for **enforcing the Code of Conduct**
- **SAA Captains** are a group of appointed volunteers who lead the enforcement of the Code of Conduct and ensure that DCON runs smoothly.

SAA CAPTAIN DUTIES

- Overlook SAA volunteers and helping the SAA Coordinator with any tasks prior to DCON.
- Monitor all members' behavior and enforce DCON rules.

"How do I become an SAA Captain?"

Information about SAA Captain applications will be released before DCON. After the application process, SAA Captain Candidates will be interview by SAA Coordinator, Raelynn Esguerra.

delegate

What is a delegate?

Delegates vote for the 2022-2023 District Executive Board

Each club in attendance at DCON **MUST** have **TWO** registered delegates.

delegate (cont.)

How do I become a delegate?

If interested, speak with your club officer board about becoming a delegate for your club. Your club will then register you as a delegate once agreed upon.

presenters

Who presents workshops at DCON?

YOU! District Board members, guest speakers, and members like you can present workshops at DCON to better educate the District.

How do I become a presenter?

Information about presenter applications will be released before DCON. After the application process, presenter candidates will be interviewed by the Membership Development & Education Committee.

REMINDERS

before you go...

- Double check that your chaperone has **booked hotels** and **secured transportation**
- Make sure that you're properly registered, including **each club having two SAAs and two delegates**
- Work out **chaperone arrangements** so that you match the 10:1 student-to-chaperone same gender ratio per club/division
- Use the **DCON packing list** to ensure you've packed everything you'll need for DCON

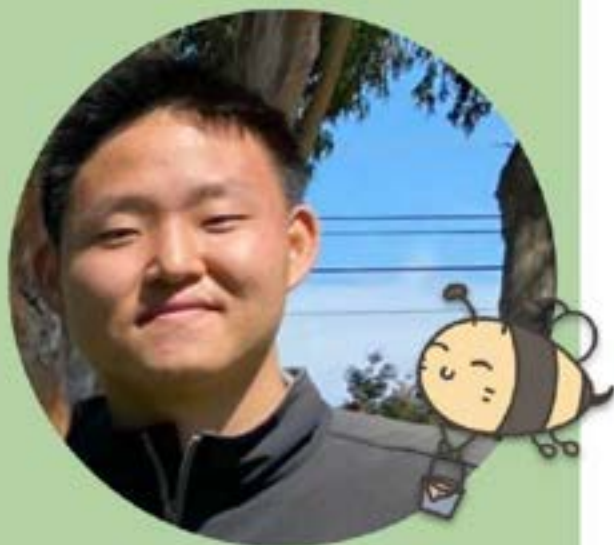
What was your Key Club moment?

f a q s

1. Who is eligible?

Any dues paid member that has paid by December 1st from clubs in good standing throughout the CaliNev-Ha Key Club District is eligible. A member may not start counting service hours or other MRP requirements until dues are paid. If you were already a dues paid member of Key Club in the previous year and are in good standing, you may count summer hours. Those who transfer schools may also have their hours transferred over to the new school that they attend.

2. When is the MRP applicable?

All Key Club sponsored activities held from April 1st, 2021 to January 31st, 2022 count towards the MRP award.

3. Do I need to submit anything for MRP?

The Member Recognition Program is recorded by your club Secretary, meaning they should be the ones keeping track of your MRP status. You do not need to submit anything yourself as a member, but make sure your club submits MRP on time and accurately to their Lt. Governor.

4. How do I keep track of my MRP status?

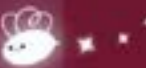
It is recommended that you keep track of your own hours and events attended, even if your club already does it for you. Member Recognition Program is recorded on its respective tab in the Club's Secretary Monthly Report Form.

5. Can a single event be counted within two different categories?

Yes. Some events fall under multiple categories. For example, if your club hosts a beach clean-up service project with your local Kiwanis Club, this would count towards both "service hours" and "Kiwanis Event", and maybe even "Interclub".

6. How do I determine how much money I've raised for MNT if I fundraised with my club?

If a member participates in a club fundraiser for the Eliminate Project, the amount that will go toward the member's "Lives Saved" section on the MRP will equal the total funds raised from the event divided by the number of members who participated in the fundraiser.

The best way to make sure you're on the road to success for the MRP is to learn how to **break up the categories**. Figuring out which categories can be dealt with early on is the **key** to making the MRP less intimidating! Below are some common examples!

Articles/Visuals Submitted

What To Do: Take a candid photo at a Key Club event and write a 50-100 word description using the article template your Division uses. Submit to your club editor and repeat once more to max out this section!

Division Events

What To Do: Attend your Division's monthly DCMs and at least 1 Division-wide service events this month. Repeat two more times and you will have maxed out this category!

NOTE: These are just some examples, you should contact your LTG for even more examples to help set you on the path for MRP recognition!

- ★ Each member in each Key Club is required to pay dues **every year**
 - \$4.50 to District, \$7 to International
- ★ Dues are effective on October 1st or the day member joins
- ★ A copy of the roster from Membership Update Center (MUC) must accompany dues payment

Why are dues important?

The money from dues goes to scholarships, budgeting, and materials that all go back to the members! Without dues, Key Club won't be able to function!

DUE PROCESS

What is the Due Process?

Due Process ≠ Impeachment

Due process is the start of an officer removal. Club Officers do not have total control over removing an officer from office. The removal of an officer should be the last resort! The Board of Directors should help the officer in question to grow and learn from their mistakes.



Reminders

The rules regarding the club's due process should be outlined in the club bylaws. You can also find the Standard Club Bylaws at: keyclub.org/resources/standard-form-club-bylaws/

- 1 Any member may recommend the removal of a club officer to the Board of Directors (club officers)
- 2 The President, Kiwanis Advisor and Faculty Advisor shall meet with the officer in question to privately discuss how the officer can improve their performance.
- 3 If the officer continues to neglect their responsibilities, the Board of Directors must hold a meeting to either approve or reject the recommendation. This will allow both sides to share their sides of the story to make a fair decision.
- 4 If approved, a meeting should be held with the entire club to vote on the removal of an officer.
- 5 A majority vote of 2/3 of club membership is required for the removal to be approved.
- 6 In the event that any officer is removed from office, they will be notified by the secretary in writing
- 7 The school, advisors, and Lt. Governor should be notified of the removal.

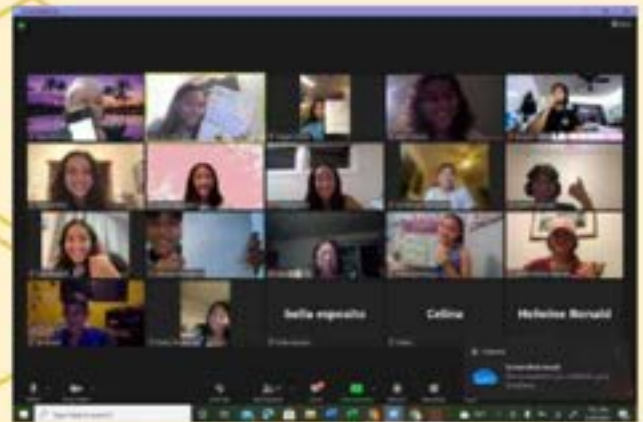

November: Keeping the Momentum

- With Fall Rally North already done, and Fall Rally South soon to be over, many wonder: what's next? The time after Fall Rally is crucial to clubs and the division, and it is the job of all leaders in Key Club to maintain the momentum for FRS/FRN so that there are no significant declines in membership or participation.

EVENTS

The most important part of keeping the momentum is keeping the fun. The reason why there is normally a drop-off in participation following Fall Rally is that many do not think that there are any fun events left. This is where, as officers and even members, you need to help plan exciting events. Make sure each event has some social aspects, and heavily promote major events that are region-wide with a similar process to fall rally (required events building up to the final exciting event). The most important thing is that you model events/planning/club functions off of the Fall Rally season. Similar to FRS/FRN make videos and other promotional materials to make each event seem like the most awesome event. A good rule of thumb is to have at least one major event as a club every 2 months. Whether this is a Friendsgiving social/service, ice skating social, Rose Float Decorating, or others (check out the spotlight on service for more inspiration), promotion is key. For these major events promote a month in advance and maybe even hold smaller events that build into the final event just as spirit nights build into FRS/FRN.

ASK!

Fall Rally is arguably the most popular event of the year. However, as leaders in your club, you might not know where to take the club from here. So do not be afraid to ask your members about what events they would like to see. Members, do not be afraid to speak up about fun ideas you have for this club. This process makes the planning of events more personal and almost guarantees that more members will come and enjoy what you have prepared for them.



COMMUNICATION

For Fall Rally, many lines of communication were likely opened. Whether that is group chats, new email groups, or even larger social media followings, there are many avenues of communication that are opened by FRS/FRN. As club and division officers take this as a gift and do not let these lines of communication die. Following Fall Rally, transform these lines of communication into platforms to keep members updated about the next major event. Whatever you do, do not spam! Continue communication just as you did before Fall Rally, with frequent reminders and new visuals to promote your upcoming exciting events.

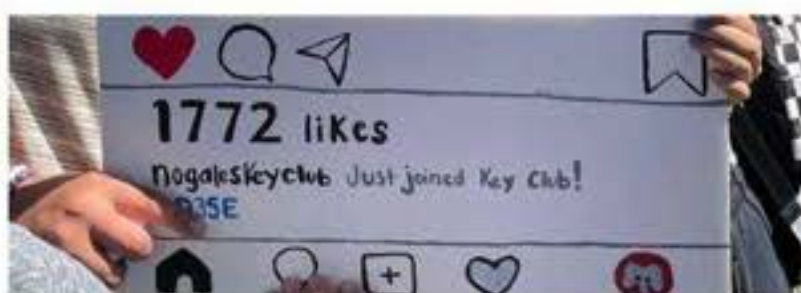
