





MEMBER OF THE YEAR

The Member-of-the-Year Contest is a **District** contest that is judged on the **DIVISION** level, which means that each division is eligible to have **ONE** Member-of-the-Year. This contest is designed for a member to showcase their dedication to Key Club and its value all in one membership term. Aside from the baseline categories that all **E-Portfolios** are judged on, the Member-of-the-Year Contest is also based upon **SIX** other categories:

- Commitment to Service
- Commitment to the Core Values of key Club
- Active Membership
- Kiwanis Family
- Personal Contributions
- Inspirational Qualities

SANDY NININGER

The Sandy Nininger Contest is a District Contest that is also recognized on the International level. This is a contest reserved for members who have truly gone above and beyond in their duties as a Key Club member. They also must have demonstrated all four core values throughout the duration of their Key Club Membership.

Aside from the fact that Member-of-the-Year is judged on a Division level, the two of these contests contain **little to no differences** in terms of rubric. The Sandy Nininger Contest requires the same **six additional categories** as seen in the MOTY Contest, but is judged on a larger level.

HOW TO RUN FOR LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR



Running for Lieutenant Governor requires many prerequisites. This step-by-step guide will instruct you on the steps that are necessary to run for this highly coveted position. Read on for more information regarding the steps and Conclave procedure!

#1 ATTEND CTC (Recommended)

To inform yourself of the duties of a Lieutenant Governor and receive personal input from LTGs

themselves. (cnhkeyclub.org > Events > Training Conference > Candidate Training Conference).

#2 Complete the INTENT TO RUN Registration Form

cnhkeyclub.org > Resources > District Officers > Running for District or International.

The information submitted is used for proper planning for elections in the new term

#3 Complete the SERVICE AGREEMENT Forms

The official paperworks will all the required signatures needs to be submitted to the CNH District office

and received at least one week prior to the division or region conclave.



CNH | KEY CLUB

CONCLAVE PROCEDURE

Conclave is set up by your current Lieutenant Governor and usually takes place between January through February. More than half of the dues-paid clubs must be in attendance in order for the election to be valid.

- Prior to conclave, those running for the position of Lieutenant Governor must submit all forms one week prior to conclave and must have already set up a meeting with the Region Advisor. Those who are not running for a position do not need to prepare for it beforehand.
- The seating is up to the Lieutenant Governor they may choose to be seated according to club, by delegates/non-delegates, etc. Delegates are two people from a dues-paid club who may vote.
- The host(s) is/are the current Lieutenant Governor(s) (Except in the case when the current Lieutenant Governor is seeking a second term, then the Region Advisor would host conclave). They will inform members of electron procedures and rules of caucus in the beginning of the conclave session.
- The introduction of candidates is to happen before any speeches/the caucus session. Any literatures
 have been distributed at this time.
- During caucus, candidates will have a set amount of time for their speech followed by a set amount of time for a session of questions asked by the members. The Lieutenant Governor hosting the conclave session will give the times of each.
- During caucus, anyone is allowed to ask questions but the Lieutenant Governor and other moderators
 will determine whether or not the question is appropriate. If deemed inappropriate, the candidate will
 not be given the chance to answer it.
- During the caucus session, if there is more than one person running, all other candidates who are not speaking will have to exit the room. The candidates will enter and exit as told to do so by the current Lieutenant Governor.
- If there are more than two candidates, a nominating conference will take place to narrow the candidates to the top two.
- 9. Voting will now take place between the two candidates. The delegates may vote for only one candidate. However, if they feel neither one of them is capable and competent enough to fill the spot of Lieutenant Governor, they may choose "no confidence." If more than half of the delegates choose that option, a Lieutenant Governor may be appointed if no one is deemed suitable.
- Results will be announced at the end of conclave, after the votes are counted, but they will not begin
 their term until they are officially installed during District Convention.

They have even invited us back to do this project again another time."

A few days later, we scheduled a meeting date to discuss date, time location, instructions, required forms, guidelines, preparation, and publication. We planned the event for October 27 from 2-5 PM at our school's Raider Hall. At the event, we decided for the members to decorate white paper bags, make cards/crafts for the bag, and add candy. During the event, we had the tables face each other so that members could interact with other members from Key Club as well as UNICEF. During the event, we were playing our "SafeKey" playlists and took song requests from our members. They will deliver the collected candy to deployed service members and veterans who will hopefully love the sweet treats and reminders of home.


