


How many friends do you have that aren't currently in Key Club? Would it be that difficult, to take just a little bit of time to show them what this organization is all about, so that they join?





Commit-TEA Tips for Club Rush

- BEE mindful of deadlines If your school requires paperwork in order to participate in Club Rush, make sure not to procrastinate and turn it in ASAP!
- Prepare in advance Before the actual club rush day, be prepared! Designate who's running the booth and for how long, coordinate all the materials being brought, and nail down any other logistics to ensure a successful event.
- Show off your spirit Show off your division/school spirit by sporting your best Key Club merch at Club Rush! People are more likely to approach your booth if they see some sort of unity or something big and bright (like a spirit stick)!
- Bring Incentives If big and bold spirit sticks don't do the trick, incentives usually do! You could potentially give away old merch or candy. If you do decide to bring candy, try to bring ones that other clubs aren't giving away!

CONVENTION

International Convention, abbreviated as ICON, was one of the most formative experiences that Key Club has to offer. This year's convention took place in Georgia, Atlanta! From July 10th to 14th, districts from across the globe came together to celebrate the successes of the past service year while welcoming in the new one.

This year was exceptionally exciting, marking the 99th birthday of Key Club International. "Go for gold" was the theme!


